

Clayton White earned undergraduate and graduate degrees in music education and composition from Temple University. He completed postgraduate studies in voice and conducting at Westminster Choir College. Returning to Westminster as Guest Lecturer in African-American Church Music, he fulfilled that same role at the University of Pennsylvania lecturing on The Evolution of African-American Spirituals and Gospel Music. Retired after serving 33 years as Department Chair and Professor of Music at Community College of Philadelphia, Clayton White now works as Music Director of The Clayton White Singers and Minister of Music at Janes Memorial United Methodist Church in Philadelphia. An accomplished conductor, composer, choral arranger, vocal coach and accompanist, his credits include recording, radio, television, and film. GIA Publications in Chicago recently released his collection of 30 African-American Concert Spirituals, Tryin' to Get Ready.



Dr. Jason C. Tramm is the newly appointed Choral Director for the Ocean Grove Camp Meeting Association. He also serves as Minister of Music at Morrow Memorial Methodist Church in Maplewood, N.J. Dr. Tramm is the Artistic Director of the Summit Music Festival, Musical Director of the Coro Lirico, Director of the Vocal Division of the International Concert Alliance and Chorus Master of the New Jersey State Opera. Dr. Tramm earned his Bachelor of Music degree from SUNY Potsdam, his Master of Music from the Hartt School of the University of Hartford and the Doctor of Musical Arts degree from Rutgers University. He taught on the music faculties of Drew University and Rutgers University.




Dr. Cindy Bell, an Ocean Grove native, is appearing in her twentieth Choir Festival as a guest conductor. In her full-time role as Assistant Professor for the Aaron Copland School of Music, Queens College, CUNY, she directs the 70-voice Queens College Chorus and teaches graduate and undergraduate students. A specialist in choral music education and community choirs, Dr. Bell presents workshops and clinics for state, divisional and national music education and choral conferences such as Music Educators National Conference (MENC) and American Choral Directors Association (ACDA), and guest conducts choirs of all ages, including recent All-County Choruses in the greater New York Area. A published author, Dr. Bell is presently conducting research with her father, Ocean Grove historian Ted Bell, on the history of the Auditorium and its various Camp Meeting musical programs over the last 138 years.



For ten years, **Dr. John L. Wilson** has been the Director of Music Ministries at the 8,000 member Choral Ridge Presbyterian Church in Florida where he administers a program of 15 choirs including the 100 voice Chancel Choir, which appears weekly on the international television program "The Choral Ridge Hour." He previously served 11 years as Director of Music at Haddonfield United Methodist Church in N.J. Dr. Wilson holds a Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the American Conservatory of Music in Chicago and a Master of Sacred Music Degree from the School of Sacred Music at Union Seminary in New York City where he studied organ with Alec Wyton and conducting with Abraham Kaplan. He has also studied conducting with Robert Shaw , Joseph Flummerfelt, Rene Clausen, Elaine Brown, and Clarence Martin. His undergraduate degree in Church Music is from Westminster College in New Wilmington, PA, with additional graduate study at Westminster Choir College in Princeton, NJ. He also holds the Associate and Choirmaster Degrees from the American Guild of Organists. Dr. Wilson has conducted most of the major sacred choral works with full orchestra and has produced several CD recordings.



Thomas Berdos, church musician and teacher, earned his Bachelor of Music in Music Education and his Master of Music in Music Performance at the University of Lowell. As an undergraduate pianist, he won the university's Concerto Competition. Mr. Berdos has performed in Asia, South America, and a number of locations in the United States, and has been featured on Japanese Television as a piano instructor. He has also served as adjunct music faculty at a number of colleges and universities. Mr. Berdos is the Director of Music Ministries at First Presbyterian Church in Mendham, NJ, where he conducts the Sanctuary Choir and other ensembles. He is also on the music faculty of the Pingry School in Short Hills and Martinsville, NJ, and is on the Artistic Advisory Board of the NJ Youth Chorus. Mr. Berdos has presented several concert programs at Ocean Grove under the auspices of the Gospel Music Ministries, and has been a guest conductor at a number of Ocean Grove Choir Festivals.



Charles Hausmann has been the Director of Choral Studies and Professor of Conducting at the Moores School of Music, University of Houston, since 1985 where he conducts the Moores School Choral Artists, teaches choral conducting and literature, and supervises the master's and doctoral programs in conducting. As conductor of the Houston Symphony Chorus, Dr. Hausmann has prepared the chorus for over 300 performances with the Symphony and has led them on tours to Mexico and Europe. He is also active as a church musician serving as Director of the St. Philip Presbyterian Church Choir in Houston. Holding degrees from Westminster Choir College, The College of New Jersey and the Conservatory of Music at the University of Missouri, Dr Hausmann is a choral clinician, guest conductor, vocal soloist and co-author of a textbook on choral music. Choirs under his direction have received acclaim through appearances at major musical conventions and festivals in the United States and Europe.




Lewis A. Daniels was the Director of Music for the Ocean Grove Camp Meeting Association for 39 years. His career spanned 59 years having served as Minister of Music for Twelfth United Presbyterian Church, Johnson Memorial United Methodist Church in Philadelphia, Addisville Reformed Church in Richboro, PA, Community United Methodist Church in Roselle Park, NJ, and St. John's United Methodist Church in Hazlet, NJ. Studies were at Drexel University, Philadelphia Musical Academy and the Philadelphia College of Bible. Mr. Daniels taught worship and music workshops for a number of organizations. He also served as music director for several evangelists on radio and television as well as major Christian rallies. He conducted many major oratorios with symphony orchestras. Now he acts as a resource advisor to younger church musicians.



Dr. Gordon Turk, Auditorium Organist, has won critical acclaim as a concert organist throughout the USA, Europe and Asia, and has been awarded competition prizes and honors in performance and improvisation. His concert venues this year have included concert halls, universities, and churches throughout the US. Included in these concerts have been inaugural recitals for new organs, in NY, CT, and two new pipe organs in PA, including Philadelphia's Kimmel Center, with three subsequent appearances there. Dr. Turk has presented master classes and lectured in colleges and conservatories throughout the US in the past year. He has also collaborated with principal players of the New York Philharmonic and the Philadelphia Orchestra this season in concert performances and in recording. Dr. Turk is Founder and Director of the chamber music festival Summer Stars, now in its fifteenth season, he is Director of Music at St. Mary's Episcopal Church in Wayne, PA, and also serves as a member of the Executive Board of the Philadelphia Chapter of the American Guild of Organists.



Faith Daniels resided in Willow Grove, PA, during her formative years. Beginning at an early age, she studied piano at the Philadelphia Conservatory of music. However her professional life began as a nurse having graduated from Presbyterian Hospital in Philadelphia. Later she went on to study the pipe organ with Virginia Cheesman of the Westminster Choir College faculty. Mrs. Daniels served as organist at the Reformed Church of North and Southampton, Churchville, PA, and at St. John's United Methodist Church in Hazlet, NJ. Her talents give her the ability to be equally comfortable as a church pianist or as an accompanist for soloist and choruses. She was the pianist for large Christian rallies and radio programs performing as a soloist as well as accompanist. Mrs. Daniels was the pianist at the Ocean Grove Great Auditorium for 39 years. Churches engage her to play for celebrations and special services because her exciting style inspires audiences.


