### **CONDUCTORS**



Patrick Gardner is the Director of Choral Activities at Rutgers University and leads the Riverside Choral Society in New York City. He has conducted RCS in performances of the Beethoven Missa Solemnis, Brahms Requiem, the Stravinsky Symphony of Psalms and numerous other works at Lincoln Center. RCS has performed with the Kirov Orchestra and the Rotterdam Philharmonic at Carnegie Hall and Lincoln Center in major choral symphonic works by Mahler and Shostakovich. Dr. Gardner prepared the chorus for the Mark Morris Dance Company's presentation of Handel's L'Allegro, Penseroso ed il Moderato at Lincoln Center and Dido and Aeneas at the Brooklyn Academy of Music. He has also prepared choruses for the Mostly Mozart Festival Orchestra at Lincoln Center, the Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment, the Philadelphia Orchestra, the Detroit Symphony, the Austin Symphony, and the Brooklyn Philharmonic. His recent orchestral concerts have included performances of the Brahms' Second Symphony, Schubert's Fifth Symphony and Piano Concerti of Mozart, Schumann and Shostakovich.



Noel Werner has been the Director of Music at Nassau Presbyterian Church in Princeton, NJ since 2006. Prior to this position, he was the Minister of Music at Central Presbyterian Church in Summit, NJ for eleven years, and is a past dean of the Metropolitan New Jersey Chapter of the American Guild of Organists. He holds a Bachelor's Degree from Westminster Choir College, and he earned a Master's Degree from Indiana University. Additionally, Mr. Werner holds a Master's Degree in Theological Studies from Christian Theological Seminary (Disciples of Christ) in Indianapolis, IN. He is a past director of the Intermediate Choir of the New Jersey Youth Chorus, and has conducted a number of festival choirs in addition to his work at church.



Dr. Jason C. Tramm serves as the Director of Music Ministries for the Ocean Grove Camp Meeting Association. In addition to this Dr. Tramm holds the following positions: Music Director of the New Jersey State Opera, Music Director of Coro Lirico, Artistic Director of the Summit Music Festival and the Director of Music at Morrow Memorial United Methodist Church in Maplewood, NJ. Equally at home in sacred and secular music, Dr. Tramm is an experienced orchestral conductor and a sought-after vocal clinician and adjudicator. On September 14th, Dr. Tramm will lead the New Jersey State Opera and an international roster of opera stars in a concert in the Great Auditorium - an event you won't want to miss! Jason, his wife Angel, and their four children are proud to live in Ocean Grove during the summer months.



Michael Sanflippo is now in his fourteenth year as the director of the music program at Community United Methodist Church in Roselle Park, NJ. Additionally, he is the Associate Music Director and Director of the Apprentice Program at the Newark Boys Chorus School. He has been a guest conductor of festival and honor choirs and a workshop clinician throughout the tri-state area. Mr. Sanflippo is active as a board member of the New Jersey American Choral Directors Association and serves as the Repertoire and Standards Chair for Women Choirs. He completed his undergraduate study in music theory at the Philadelphia College of Performing Arts, followed by a year at the Kodaly Institute in Kecskemet, Hungary, where he studied choral conducting and music education. He completed a master's degree from Teacher's College, Columbia University in New York and has studied with several conductors including Peter Erdei and Dino Anagnost. In addition to his choral duties at Newark Boys Chorus School, Mr. Sanflippo teaches theory and ear-training. He also conducts two community choirs: Harmony Singers of Wayne, NJ, and Concord Singers, based in Summit, NJ.



Adam Waite, pianist, composer, and conductor was recently appointed Artistic Director of Lyrica Chamber Music and the Music Director and and Arranger for Broadway Cares: Carols for a Cure, for which he has conducted and arranged for numerous Broadway casts. He has also conducted the Lyrica Chamber Orchestra, the Henry Mancini Institute Orchestra, the College of New Jersey Festival Ensemble and numerous premieres of student works at UCLA and Carnegie Mellon. As a pianist, Mr. Waite has performed on Good Morning America, has played with numerous jazz musicians, and has been featured at a wide variety of venues, including the Opening Gala for the Walt Disney Concert Hall. As a composer he has received many performances of his works from various ensembles throughout the country. This includes the Henry Mancini Institute Orchestra, which in July of 2003 premiered his *The Tool Collector*. Mr. Waite is also the recipient of numerous ASCAP Composition Awards and the prestigious Harry G. Archer Prize in Composition for his orchestral work *Kinectic Conundrum*. He currently serves as Director of Music for the Presbyterian Church of Chatham Township. Born and raised in Albany, NY, Mr. Waite attended Carnegie Mellon University and UCLA, where he studied music composition.




Dr. Cindy Bell, joined Hofstra University in Hempstead, NY, in 2008, as Associate Professor of Music Education and Director of the 80-voice University Choir. This appointment follows an eight year position at Queens College, CUNY. A specialist in choral music education, teacher training and community choirs, Dr. Bell directs workshops for state, divisional and national music education and choral conferences, and guest conducts choirs for all ages, including recent All County Choruses in the greater New York Area. An Ocean Grove native, Dr. Bell is working with her father, local historian Ted Bell, writing the history of the Great Auditorium and its music programs. This week, she travels to Rome for the International Society of Music Education's XI Community Music Activity Seminar to present research on the history of the Ocean Grove Auditorium Choir.



Lewis A. Daniels was the Director of Music for the Ocean Grove Camp Meeting Association for 39 years. His career spanned 59 years having served as Minister of Music for Twelfth United Presbyterian Church, Johnson Memorial United Methodist Church and Frankford Memorial United Methodist Church in Philadelphia, Addisville Reformed Church in Richboro, PA, Community United Methodist Church in Roselle Park, NJ, and St. John's United Methodist Church in Hazlet, NJ. Studies were at Drexel University, Philadelphia Musical Academy and the Philadelphia College of Bible. Mr. Daniels taught worship and music workshops for a number of organizations. He also served as music director for several evangelists on radio and television as well as major Christian rallies. He conducted many major oratorios with symphony orchestras. Now he acts as a resource advisor to younger church musicians.



Dr. Gordon Turk, Auditorium Organist, has won critical acclaim as a concert organist throughout the USA, Europe and Asia, and has been awarded competition prizes and honors in performance and improvisation. His concert venues this year have included concert halls, universities, and churches throughout the US. Included in these concerts have been inaugural recitals for new organs in New York, Connecticut, and two new pipe organs in Pennsylvania, including Philadelphia's Kimmel Center, with three subsequent appearances there. Dr. Turk has presented master classes and lectured in colleges and conservatories throughout the US in the past year. He has also collaborated with principal players of the New York Philharmonic and the Philadelphia Orchestra this season in concert performances and in recording. Dr. Turk is Founder and Director of the chamber music festival Summer Stars, now in its fifteenth season. He is Director of Music at St. Mary's Episcopal Church in Wayne, PA, and also serves as a member of the Executive Board of the Philadelphia Chapter of the American Guild of Organists.



Mario Lombardo is a composer of more than 200 songs, 5 musicals, and many works for piano, chorus, concert band, and orchestra. His music has been performed by the orchestras of Chicago, Boston, Detroit, Cincinnati, New Jersey, and numerous other orchestras throughout the United States and Europe. Maestro Erich Kunzel conducted the premiere of Lombardo's Variations in a Mod Mood, Symphonic Ode, Revival, and his symphonic tale for children Drakestail, which enjoyed international success, having been performed and recorded by the Berlin Radio Orchestra. His Concerto for Oboe and Orchestra was recorded in May by the Sofia Philharmonic in Bulgaria. All his works are published by Warner Bros. Music Corp. Sing Unto the Lord a New Song is Lombardo's sixth psalm, presented at the annual choir festival. He recorded ten of his theater love songs with resident tenor Ronald Naldi in a CD entitled As I Recall Our Love.



Dr. Gwyneth Walker is a graduate of Brown University and the Hartt School of Music. She holds B.A., M.M. and D.M.A. Degrees in Music Composition. A former faculty member of the Oberlin College Conservatory, she resigned from academic employment in 1982 in order to pursue a career as a full-time composer. She now lives on a dairy farm in Braintree, Vermont. Dr. Walker's catalog includes over 170 commissioned works for orchestra, band, chorus and chamber ensembles. The music of Gwyneth Walker is published by E.C. Schirmer of Boston (choral/vocal music) and MMB Music of St. Louis (orchestral/instrumental music). Commissions for the coming year will include several works for brass quintet; a new Christmas suite, A Season of Wonder, for the Nebraska Brass, and Sweet Imagination for the Carolina Brass. Orchestral compositions will span a variety of genres: Muse of Amherst (based on poetry of Emily Dickinson) for the Holyoke, MA, Civic Symphony and narrator, The Rainbow Sign (the first in a set of American Songs for Orchestra) for the Santa Cruz, CA, Symphony; an orchestral and narrative adaptation of the Walker Acquaintance with Nature (based on the writings of H. D. Thoreau); an Idyll for Flute and Strings for the Mistral Ensemble of Andover, MA, and Voices in Song for the Walla Walla, WA, Symphony and Youth Chorus.






